To find out, we need to look at what are perhaps the four most important aspects of any story: its 'Themes and Content', how these are illustrated with 'Motifs' and how 'Narrative Structure' and 'Language' are used. Themes and Afanasiev's recordings include a large variety of folk narrative.
