Over the last 25 years he has established himself as the world's leading natural history programme maker with several landmark BBC series, including *Life on Earth* (1979), *The Living Planet* (1984), *The Trials of Life* (1990), *The Private Life of Plants* (1995) and *Life of Birds* (1998). Sir David Attenborough is a Trustee of the British Museum and the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew; an Honorary Fellow of Clare College, Cambridge; a Fellow of the Royal Society and was knighted in 1985.
