We have tried to compile in this book testimonies of indigenous peoples collected over the years by me and my wife from different sources (indigenous declarations, references from speeches, articles from international treaties, conventions, etc.). My wife and I together took some of the pictures of the Zoe tribe in 2005, before their culture started to fade away. We had the chance to stay in their village accompanied by Sidney Possuelo, possibly, the most important defender of the rights and lands of indigenous isolated tribes in Brazil. But any of the indigenous peoples shown in the photographs taken by me during the course of the last 40 years, or by my wife and me, could have formulated these thoughts, since unfortunately the aggressions and experiences to which many of these quotations and passages refer to, are common to a large number of indigenous communities in our planet. The importance of the quotations is not their literal meaning but their symbolism and global meaning which is common to all of them. Since 1979 I have been working as volunteer or activist in some cases fighting together with Indian leaders and defending the rights which led me to bring to Spain and found a group of volunteers to create the Spanish section of survival International in which I worked for many years creating in Spain Large number of members and lobby. After that, I decided to form and found another group watu acción INDIGENA foundation in which we were raising money to distribute to indigenas groups supporting their demands with different projects. From buying an aero plane to help the Department of isolated Indians of Funai, or funding indigenous activist into the convention of biological diversity. Make their voice heard or funding projects in remote areas to rain force indigenas leadership and defend them from the aggression of the countries where they live now or the international companies that are killing them.
