The reviews selected for reprinting here represent the diversity of Welty's reception and assessment. Reviews from small towns, urban centers, noted fiction writers, professional reviewers, academics, and everyday readers are included. The comments of reviewing rivals such as the *New York Times* and the *New York Herald Tribune*, *Nation* and *New Yorker*, when read side by side, reveal the nuances both of the reviewers and of the work of this important Southern writer.
