AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE: MASTERING THE KEY TO SUCCESS

AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS ARE A FUNDAMENTAL PART OF THE AP ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND COMPOSITION EXAM, AND THEY OFTEN SET THE TONE FOR HOW WELL STUDENTS PERFORM OVERALL. THESE QUESTIONS TEST MORE THAN JUST SURFACE-LEVEL READING SKILLS; THEY CHALLENGE YOUR ABILITY TO ANALYZE RHETORIC, UNDERSTAND THE NUANCES OF LANGUAGE, AND INTERPRET COMPLEX PASSAGES. IF YOU'RE GEARING UP FOR THE AP LANGUAGE EXAM, GETTING COMFORTABLE WITH THESE MULTIPLE-CHOICE SECTIONS IS ESSENTIAL.

IN THIS ARTICLE, WE'LL DIVE DEEP INTO WHAT THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION ENTAILS, EXPLORE STRATEGIES TO TACKLE VARIOUS QUESTION TYPES, AND OFFER PRACTICAL TIPS TO IMPROVE YOUR PERFORMANCE. WHETHER YOU'RE A FIRST-TIME TEST-TAKER OR LOOKING TO BOOST YOUR SCORE, UNDERSTANDING THE INS AND OUTS OF THIS SECTION WILL GIVE YOU A SIGNIFICANT EDGE.

UNDERSTANDING THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION

THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SEGMENT TYPICALLY INCLUDES AROUND 45 QUESTIONS THAT YOU NEED TO ANSWER WITHIN 60 MINUTES. THIS MEANS YOU HAVE ROUGHLY 1 MINUTE AND 20 SECONDS PER QUESTION, SO TIME MANAGEMENT IS CRUCIAL. THE PASSAGES PROVIDED COME FROM A VARIETY OF GENRES, INCLUDING ESSAYS, SPEECHES, LETTERS, AND ARTICLES, OFTEN RICH WITH RHETORICAL DEVICES AND COMPLEX SENTENCE STRUCTURES.

THE QUESTIONS TEST YOUR ABILITY TO DISSECT THE AUTHOR'S PURPOSE, TONE, AND STYLE, AS WELL AS YOUR UNDERSTANDING OF VOCABULARY IN CONTEXT AND THE MEANING BEHIND SPECIFIC LINES OR PHRASES. IT'S NOT JUST ABOUT WHAT THE TEXT SAYS BUT HOW IT SAYS IT.

TYPES OF QUESTIONS YOU'LL ENCOUNTER

WHEN PREPARING FOR THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION, IT HELPS TO KNOW THE COMMON CATEGORIES OF QUESTIONS:

- **RHETORICAL ANALYSIS QUESTIONS:** THESE ASK YOU TO IDENTIFY THE AUTHOR'S INTENT OR THE EFFECT OF A RHETORICAL DEVICE, SUCH AS ETHOS, PATHOS, LOGOS, METAPHOR, OR IRONY.
- **VOCABULARY IN CONTEXT:** HERE, YOU NEED TO DETERMINE THE MEANING OF A WORD OR PHRASE BASED ON HOW IT'S USED WITHIN THE PASSAGE.
- **DETAILS AND EVIDENCE:** THESE QUESTIONS FOCUS ON SPECIFIC LINES OR DETAILS IN THE PASSAGE AND REQUIRE YOU TO RECALL OR INTERPRET THEM ACCURATELY.
- **INFERENCE QUESTIONS:** SOMETIMES YOU'LL NEED TO READ BETWEEN THE LINES TO UNDERSTAND WHAT IS IMPLIED RATHER THAN EXPLICITLY STATED.
- **STRUCTURE AND ORGANIZATION:** THESE ASK YOU TO ANALYZE HOW THE PASSAGE IS ORGANIZED AND HOW THAT STRUCTURE CONTRIBUTES TO THE OVERALL MEANING OR EFFECT.

KNOWING THESE TYPES HELPS YOU TAILOR YOUR APPROACH AND QUICKLY IDENTIFY WHAT EACH QUESTION IS REALLY ASKING.

STRATEGIES TO EXCEL IN AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE

SUCCESS IN THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION HINGES ON A MIX OF STRONG READING SKILLS, CRITICAL THINKING, AND SMART STRATEGIES. HERE ARE SOME TRIED-AND-TRUE METHODS TO BOOST YOUR ACCURACY AND SPEED.

1. READ ACTIVELY AND ANNOTATE

ACTIVE READING IS YOUR BEST FRIEND DURING THE AP LANGUAGE EXAM. INSTEAD OF PASSIVELY SKIMMING THE PASSAGE, ENGAGE WITH IT BY UNDERLINING KEY PHRASES, CIRCLING UNFAMILIAR WORDS, AND JOTTING QUICK NOTES ABOUT THE TONE OR PURPOSE. THIS ANNOTATION WILL MAKE IT EASIER TO REFER BACK TO IMPORTANT PARTS OF THE TEXT WHEN ANSWERING QUESTIONS.

2. FOCUS ON RHETORICAL DEVICES

SINCE THE EXAM PLACES A STRONG EMPHASIS ON RHETORIC, FAMILIARIZE YOURSELF WITH COMMON LITERARY AND RHETORICAL DEVICES. UNDERSTANDING HOW AUTHORS USE TECHNIQUES LIKE REPETITION, ALLUSION, OR JUXTAPOSITION TO PERSUADE OR EMPHASIZE POINTS ALLOWS YOU TO SPOT THESE DEVICES QUICKLY AND INTERPRET THEIR IMPACT ACCURATELY.

3. ELIMINATE WRONG ANSWERS FIRST

WHEN YOU'RE UNSURE ABOUT A QUESTION, USE THE PROCESS OF ELIMINATION TO WEED OUT OBVIOUSLY INCORRECT OPTIONS. THIS STRATEGY IMPROVES YOUR CHANCES IF YOU NEED TO GUESS, AND IT ALSO HELPS CLARIFY WHAT THE QUESTION IS ACTUALLY TARGETING BY NARROWING DOWN CHOICES.

4. PRACTICE CONTEXTUAL VOCABULARY

VOCABULARY QUESTIONS ARE TRICKY BECAUSE WORDS CAN CHANGE MEANING DEPENDING ON CONTEXT. INSTEAD OF MEMORIZING DEFINITIONS IN ISOLATION, FOCUS ON HOW WORDS FUNCTION IN DIFFERENT PASSAGES. READING WIDELY — FROM ESSAYS TO SPEECHES — CAN EXPAND YOUR CONTEXTUAL UNDERSTANDING AND PREPARE YOU FOR THESE VOCABULARY CHALLENGES.

5. MANAGE YOUR TIME WISELY

WITH ONLY ABOUT 80 SECONDS PER QUESTION, PACING YOURSELF IS KEY. IF A QUESTION IS TAKING TOO LONG, MARK IT AND MOVE ON, THEN CIRCLE BACK IF TIME ALLOWS. PRIORITIZE QUESTIONS THAT SEEM EASIER TO BUILD CONFIDENCE AND SECURE POINTS EARLY.

USING PRACTICE TESTS TO IMPROVE YOUR AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SKILLS

THERE'S NO SUBSTITUTE FOR REAL PRACTICE WHEN IT COMES TO MASTERING THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION. PRACTICE TESTS NOT ONLY FAMILIARIZE YOU WITH THE QUESTION FORMAT BUT ALSO HELP YOU DEVELOP ENDURANCE FOR THE TIMED ENVIRONMENT.

HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF PRACTICE TESTS

- **SIMULATE TESTING CONDITIONS:** TAKE PRACTICE SECTIONS UNDER TIMED, DISTRACTION-FREE CONDITIONS TO MIRROR THE ACTUAL EXAM EXPERIENCE.
- **REVIEW EVERY QUESTION:** AFTER COMPLETING A PRACTICE TEST, CAREFULLY REVIEW EVERY MISSED QUESTION TO UNDERSTAND YOUR MISTAKES.
- **ANALYZE YOUR WEAKNESSES:** TRACK WHICH TYPES OF QUESTIONS YOU STRUGGLE WITH MOST, WHETHER IT'S INFERENCE, VOCABULARY, OR RHETORICAL ANALYSIS, AND FOCUS YOUR STUDY EFFORTS THERE.
- **USE HIGH-QUALITY MATERIALS:** UTILIZE OFFICIAL COLLEGE BOARD PRACTICE QUESTIONS OR REPUTABLE PREP BOOKS TO ENSURE THE PASSAGES AND QUESTIONS CLOSELY REFLECT THE EXAM'S STYLE AND DIFFICULTY.

COMMON CHALLENGES AND HOW TO OVERCOME THEM

MANY STUDENTS FIND THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION DAUNTING BECAUSE THE PASSAGES CAN BE DENSE AND THE QUESTIONS NUANCED. HERE ARE SOME TYPICAL HURDLES AND WAYS TO ADDRESS THEM.

CHALLENGE: DENSE AND COMPLEX PASSAGES

SOME PASSAGES ARE INTENTIONALLY CHALLENGING, PACKED WITH FORMAL OR ARCHAIC LANGUAGE. TO TACKLE THESE, SLOW DOWN YOUR READING PACE AND BREAK THE PASSAGE INTO SMALLER CHUNKS. SUMMARIZE PARAGRAPHS IN YOUR OWN WORDS AS YOU READ TO ENSURE COMPREHENSION.

CHALLENGE: MISINTERPRETING RHETORICAL PURPOSE

IT'S EASY TO CONFUSE THE AUTHOR'S PURPOSE OR THE EFFECT OF A DEVICE. WHEN IN DOUBT, RETURN TO THE PASSAGE AND LOOK FOR CLUES LIKE TONE SHIFTS, REPEATED WORDS, OR CONTRASTING IDEAS. ASK YOURSELF, "WHY DID THE AUTHOR INCLUDE THIS HERE? WHAT EFFECT DOES IT CREATE?"

CHALLENGE: TIME PRESSURE

IF TIME FLIES BY BEFORE YOU FINISH, PRACTICE TIMED DRILLS REGULARLY. BUILD YOUR STAMINA BY GRADUALLY INCREASING THE LENGTH OF YOUR READING AND QUESTION SETS. ALSO, DEVELOP THE HABIT OF QUICKLY SCANNING QUESTIONS BEFORE READING THE PASSAGE TO KNOW WHAT TO LOOK FOR.

FINAL THOUGHTS ON NAVIGATING AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE

THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION IS MORE THAN JUST A TEST OF READING COMPREHENSION; IT'S AN EXERCISE IN CRITICAL THINKING, ANALYSIS, AND UNDERSTANDING THE POWER OF LANGUAGE. BY FAMILIARIZING YOURSELF WITH THE QUESTION TYPES, HONING YOUR RHETORICAL KNOWLEDGE, AND PRACTICING STRATEGICALLY, YOU'LL FIND YOURSELF NAVIGATING THESE QUESTIONS WITH INCREASING CONFIDENCE.

REMEMBER, THE GOAL ISN'T JUST TO MEMORIZE ANSWERS BUT TO DEVELOP A NUANCED APPRECIATION FOR HOW LANGUAGE SHAPES MEANING AND PERSUASION. APPROACH THE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION AS AN OPPORTUNITY TO ENGAGE WITH THOUGHT-PROVOKING TEXTS AND SHARPEN YOUR ANALYTICAL SKILLS — BOTH OF WHICH WILL SERVE YOU WELL, NOT ONLY ON THE EXAM BUT IN FUTURE ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL ENDEAVORS.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT TYPES OF QUESTIONS ARE TYPICALLY INCLUDED IN THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION?

THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION TYPICALLY INCLUDES QUESTIONS THAT TEST RHETORICAL ANALYSIS, UNDERSTANDING OF TONE, PURPOSE, ARGUMENT, AND INTERPRETATION OF NONFICTION PROSE PASSAGES.

HOW MANY QUESTIONS ARE ON THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION?

THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION USUALLY CONTAINS AROUND 45 QUESTIONS TO BE COMPLETED IN 60 MINUTES.

WHAT SKILLS ARE MOST IMPORTANT FOR SUCCESS ON THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS?

KEY SKILLS INCLUDE CLOSE READING, IDENTIFYING RHETORICAL STRATEGIES, UNDERSTANDING AUTHOR'S PURPOSE, ANALYZING TONE AND STYLE, AND MAKING INFERENCES FROM THE TEXT.

ARE THE MULTIPLE CHOICE PASSAGES IN AP LANGUAGE FICTION OR NONFICTION?

THE MULTIPLE CHOICE PASSAGES IN AP LANGUAGE ARE PRIMARILY NONFICTION, INCLUDING ESSAYS, SPEECHES, LETTERS, AND OTHER RHETORICAL TEXTS.

HOW CAN STUDENTS BEST PREPARE FOR THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION?

STUDENTS CAN PREPARE BY PRACTICING WITH PAST EXAM QUESTIONS, IMPROVING THEIR CRITICAL READING SKILLS, STUDYING RHETORICAL DEVICES, AND TIMING THEMSELVES TO SIMULATE TEST CONDITIONS.

WHAT IS THE SCORING WEIGHT OF THE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION IN THE AP LANGUAGE EXAM?

THE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION COUNTS FOR 45% OF THE OVERALL AP LANGUAGE EXAM SCORE.

ARE THERE ANY GUESSING PENALTIES ON THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION?

NO, THERE IS NO PENALTY FOR GUESSING ON THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION, SO STUDENTS SHOULD ANSWER EVERY QUESTION.

HOW SHOULD STUDENTS APPROACH DIFFICULT QUESTIONS ON THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION?

STUDENTS SHOULD ELIMINATE CLEARLY WRONG ANSWERS, LOOK FOR TEXTUAL EVIDENCE, CONSIDER THE AUTHOR'S INTENT, AND IF UNSURE, MAKE AN EDUCATED GUESS RATHER THAN LEAVING IT BLANK.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE: AN IN-DEPTH EXAMINATION OF STRATEGIES AND STRUCTURE

AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE REMAINS A PIVOTAL COMPONENT OF THE AP ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND COMPOSITION EXAM, TESTING STUDENTS' ABILITIES TO ANALYZE RHETORIC, UNDERSTAND COMPLEX PASSAGES, AND APPLY CRITICAL READING SKILLS UNDER TIMED CONDITIONS. AS ONE OF THE TWO MAJOR SECTIONS OF THE EXAM, THIS PORTION CHALLENGES EXAMINEES TO DEMONSTRATE THEIR PROFICIENCY IN INTERPRETING NONFICTION TEXTS, EVALUATING ARGUMENTS, AND DISCERNING AUTHORIAL INTENT THROUGH CAREFULLY CRAFTED MULTIPLE-CHOICE QUESTIONS. UNDERSTANDING THE STRUCTURE, COMMON QUESTION TYPES, AND EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES FOR THIS SECTION CAN SIGNIFICANTLY INFLUENCE PERFORMANCE OUTCOMES.

UNDERSTANDING THE STRUCTURE OF THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION

THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE-CHOICE SEGMENT TYPICALLY CONSISTS OF AROUND 45 QUESTIONS TO BE COMPLETED WITHIN 60 MINUTES. THIS ALLOCATION DEMANDS BOTH SPEED AND ACCURACY, WITH EACH QUESTION DESIGNED TO ASSESS A SPECIFIC ANALYTICAL SKILL. PASSAGES ARE PRIMARILY NONFICTION AND RANGE FROM ESSAYS, SPEECHES, AND LETTERS TO EXCERPTS FROM HISTORICAL DOCUMENTS AND CONTEMPORARY JOURNALISM. THE DIVERSITY OF TEXTS ENSURES THAT STUDENTS MUST BE ADAPTABLE, ABLE TO NAVIGATE DIFFERENT WRITING STYLES AND RHETORICAL CONTEXTS.

EACH PASSAGE IS FOLLOWED BY SEVERAL QUESTIONS THAT PROBE DIFFERENT ASPECTS OF THE TEXT, INCLUDING TONE, PURPOSE, RHETORICAL DEVICES, VOCABULARY IN CONTEXT, AND LOGICAL REASONING. THE EXAM'S EMPHASIS ON RHETORICAL ANALYSIS MEANS THAT STUDENTS ARE OFTEN ASKED TO IDENTIFY THE EFFECT OF SPECIFIC LITERARY OR RHETORICAL TECHNIQUES, SUCH AS METAPHOR, IRONY, PARALLELISM, OR DICTION, ON THE OVERALL ARGUMENT.

TYPES OF QUESTIONS IN AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE

QUESTIONS IN THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION CAN BE CATEGORIZED BROADLY INTO SEVERAL TYPES:

- **DETAIL AND COMPREHENSION QUESTIONS:** THESE REQUIRE STUDENTS TO FIND SPECIFIC INFORMATION OR UNDERSTAND THE MAIN IDEA OF A PASSAGE.
- **INFERENCE QUESTIONS:** STUDENTS INTERPRET IMPLICIT MEANINGS OR DRAW CONCLUSIONS BASED ON THE TEXT.
- **VOCABULARY IN CONTEXT:** THESE ASSESS THE ABILITY TO DETERMINE THE MEANING OF WORDS OR PHRASES AS THEY FUNCTION WITHIN THE PASSAGE.
- **RHETORICAL STRATEGY AND DEVICE IDENTIFICATION:** QUESTIONS FOCUS ON HOW THE AUTHOR USES LANGUAGE TO PERSUADE OR INFORM.
- **AUTHOR'S PURPOSE AND TONE:** EXAMINEES ANALYZE THE AUTHOR'S ATTITUDE AND INTENT BEHIND THE WRITING.
- **LOGICAL AND STRUCTURAL ANALYSIS:** THESE QUESTIONS EXPLORE HOW THE PASSAGE IS ORGANIZED AND HOW ARGUMENTS ARE CONSTRUCTED.

THE VARIETY WITHIN THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION TESTS THE BREADTH AND DEPTH OF A STUDENT'S ANALYTICAL SKILLS, MAKING IT ESSENTIAL FOR TEST-TAKERS TO FAMILIARIZE THEMSELVES WITH ALL QUESTION TYPES.

EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES FOR NAVIGATING AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE

SUCCESS IN THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE SECTION HINGES NOT ONLY ON READING COMPREHENSION BUT ALSO ON STRATEGIC TIME MANAGEMENT AND CRITICAL THINKING. GIVEN THE TIME CONSTRAINTS, STUDENTS MUST BALANCE SPEED WITH CAREFUL ANALYSIS.

ACTIVE READING AND ANNOTATION

ONE OF THE MOST EFFECTIVE TECHNIQUES IS ACTIVE READING. THIS INVOLVES ANNOTATING THE TEXT BY UNDERLINING KEY IDEAS, CIRCLING UNFAMILIAR VOCABULARY, AND NOTING RHETORICAL DEVICES OR SHIFTS IN TONE. ACTIVE ENGAGEMENT PREVENTS PASSIVE READING, WHICH OFTEN LEADS TO MISINTERPRETATION OR OVERLOOKING CRUCIAL DETAILS.

ELIMINATING WRONG ANSWERS

MULTIPLE-CHOICE QUESTIONS OFTEN INCLUDE DISTRACTORS—ANSWERS THAT SEEM PLAUSIBLE BUT ARE ULTIMATELY INCORRECT. A COMMON STRATEGY IS TO USE PROCESS OF ELIMINATION, DISCARDING CHOICES THAT ARE CLEARLY IRRELEVANT OR MISREPRESENT THE PASSAGE. THIS IMPROVES THE ODDS OF SELECTING THE CORRECT ANSWER, ESPECIALLY WHEN UNSURE.

UNDERSTANDING RHETORICAL DEVICES AND TERMINOLOGY

FAMILIARITY WITH RHETORICAL DEVICES AND LITERARY TERMS IS INDISPENSABLE. STUDENTS WHO CAN QUICKLY IDENTIFY TECHNIQUES SUCH AS ETHOS, PATHOS, LOGOS, IRONY, OR ANALOGY ARE BETTER EQUIPPED TO ANSWER QUESTIONS ABOUT AUTHOR'S INTENT AND STRATEGY. INCORPORATING STUDY OF RHETORICAL CONCEPTS INTO PREPARATION CAN MAKE ANSWERING MULTIPLE-CHOICE QUESTIONS MORE INTUITIVE.

TIME MANAGEMENT AND PACING

WITH APPROXIMATELY 1.3 MINUTES PER QUESTION, PACING IS CRITICAL. SPENDING TOO LONG ON ONE PASSAGE OR QUESTION CAN JEOPARDIZE THE ABILITY TO COMPLETE THE SECTION. PRACTICE EXAMS CAN HELP STUDENTS GAUGE THEIR PACING AND DEVELOP AN INSTINCT FOR WHEN TO MOVE ON.

COMPARING AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE WITH OTHER SECTIONS AND EXAMS

WHEN COMPARED TO THE AP LITERATURE MULTIPLE-CHOICE SECTION, WHICH OFTEN FOCUSES ON POETRY AND FICTIONAL PROSE ANALYSIS, THE AP LANGUAGE MULTIPLE CHOICE LEANS MORE HEAVILY ON NONFICTION AND RHETORICAL ANALYSIS. THIS DISTINCTION REQUIRES DIFFERENT PREPARATION APPROACHES. WHILE AP LITERATURE MAY REQUIRE A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF LITERARY THEMES AND DEVICES IN FICTIONAL CONTEXTS, AP LANGUAGE DEMANDS PROFICIENCY IN ARGUMENT EVALUATION AND RHETORICAL STRATEGIES IN REAL-WORLD WRITING.

MOREOVER, THE MULTIPLE-CHOICE SECTION STANDS IN CONTRAST TO THE FREE-RESPONSE PORTION OF THE AP LANGUAGE EXAM, WHICH TESTS STUDENTS' ABILITY TO COMPOSE ANALYTICAL ESSAYS. WHEREAS THE FREE-RESPONSE SECTION ASSESSES WRITING SKILLS AND ARGUMENT CONSTRUCTION, THE MULTIPLE-CHOICE SECTION EVALUATES READING COMPREHENSION AND CRITICAL THINKING. UNDERSTANDING THE COMPLEMENTARY NATURE OF THESE TWO SECTIONS CAN HELP STUDENTS DEVELOP HOLISTIC TEST-TAKING SKILLS.

PROS AND CONS OF THE MULTIPLE CHOICE FORMAT

- **PROS:**

- OBJECTIVE GRADING WITH CLEAR RIGHT OR WRONG ANSWERS.
- EFFICIENT ASSESSMENT OF A WIDE RANGE OF SKILLS WITHIN A LIMITED TIME.
- IMMEDIATE FEEDBACK POTENTIAL THROUGH PRACTICE TESTS.

- **CONS:**

- LIMITED ABILITY TO DEMONSTRATE NUANCED UNDERSTANDING.

About the Test The Advanced Placement Examination in English Language & Composition is geared toward the student who has studied the mechanics of writing and rhetoric at an advanced level, and wishes to pursue college credit. Take care not to confuse the AP Examination in English Language & Composition with the AP Examination in Literature & Composition. The Literature exam focuses on literature and literary criticism, while the Language exam deals with writing as a craft. This book is designed to help you prepare for the AP Examination in English Language & Composition only. The AP English Language & Composition Exam is divided into two sections: Section 1 - Multiple-Choice (60 minutes - accounts for 45% of total score) Five or six reading passages, with an average of 10 questions each. Section 2 - Free-Response (up to 120 minutes - accounts for 55% of total score) Three essay questions. The first section consists of five or six reading passages and sixty multiple-choice questions, which you will have one hour to complete. Each passage will be followed by an average of ten questions and thereafter the passage will not be referred to again. Do not feel pressured to remember each reading - just digest them one at a time and move on. After reading the passage, you will have approximately one minute to answer each question. The second section of the AP English Language & Composition Exam consists of three essay questions, and is divided such that you will have forty minutes to write each essay. Do not expect to be able to go back to an essay after the allotted time has elapsed. Note that each essay has very specific instructions, and most have a passage which you will read critically to answer the essay question. Your essays will be scored according to the essay structure, the clarity of your writing, and the extent to which you have answered the question. Scoring the Exam The multiple-choice section of the exam is scored by crediting each correct answer with one point and deducting one-fourth of a point for each incorrect answer. Unanswered questions receive neither a credit nor a deduction. The free- response essays are graded by more than 5,000 instructors and professors who gather together each June for a week of non-stop AP essay grading. Each essay booklet is read and scored by four graders. Each grader provides a score for the individual essays. This score is a number on a scale from 0 to 9, 0 being the lowest and 9 the highest. The graders are not aware of each other's scores. When the essays have been graded four times, the scores are averaged - one score for each of the three essays - so that the free-response section is composed of three scores. The three essays are weighted equally, and the total weight of the free-response section is fifty-five percent of the total score. The multiple-choice section accounts for forty-five percent of the total score. Each year the overall grades may fluctuate because the grading scale depends upon the performance of students in past AP administrations. The following method of scoring, along with the corresponding chart, will give you an approximation of your score. It will not indicate the exact score you would get on the actual AP English Language & Composition Exam

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
