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learn that the final consonant of some words must be doubled and the final e of some words dropped before adding an ending that begins with a vowel (shop + ing = shopping, close + ing = closing) and that the final y of some words is changed to i before adding an ending that doesn't begin with an i (cry + ed = cried). Students will be taught to recognize the different forms of verbs (simple form, -s form, present participle, past tense, past participle) and the forms of comparison for adjectives and adverbs (positive, comparative, superlative). They will also be taught how to recognize various irregular verbs and irregular comparatives and superlatives. In addition, students will discover how a root word changes in meaning when another word, a prefix, or a suffix is added to it and will learn that there are three different kinds of compound words (closed, open, and hyphenated). A practice test is included at the end of the book. The same practice test is also available online as a computer-based test. (Please read the preface of this book for additional information about the computer-based tests.) This book could be introduced to students as early as the first grade and used throughout elementary, middle, and high school. Actual testing of the content could begin as early as the 2nd or 3rd grade.
