SPOKEN BY INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES. AYMARA IS USED BY PEOPLE LIVING IN THE ANDEAN HIGHLANDS, WHILE QUECHUA, HISTORICALLY ASSOCIATED WITH THE INCA EMPIRE, IS LESS COMMONLY SPOKEN BUT STILL PRESENT.

OTHER INDIGENOUS LANGUAGES
