THIS DUALITY HIGHLIGHTS THAT MEANING IS NOT INHERENT BUT CONSTRUCTED THROUGH DIFFERENCES WITHIN THE LANGUAGE SYSTEM.
- Arbitrariness of the Sign: Saussure argued that the relationship between the signifier and signified is arbitrary, meaning there is no natural connection between the word and the concept it represents. This insight was crucial in understanding the fluidity and variability of language.
- SYNCHRONY VS. DIACHRONY: HE INTRODUCED THE IDEA THAT LANGUAGE SHOULD BE STUDIED SYNCHRONICALLY (AT A PARTICULAR POINT IN TIME) RATHER THAN SOLELY DIACHRONICALLY (THROUGH HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT), WHICH WAS THE DOMINANT METHOD BEFORE HIS WORK.

THESE IDEAS REVOLUTIONIZED LINGUISTICS BY SHIFTING THE FOCUS FROM HISTORICAL ROOTS AND ETYMOLOGY TO THE FUNCTIONAL AND STRUCTURAL ASPECTS OF LANGUAGE AS A LIVING SYSTEM.

## WHAT IS STRUCTURALISM ACCORDING TO SAUSSURE'S GENERAL LINGUISTICS COURSE?

## WHAT ROLE DOES DIFFERENCE PLAY IN SAUSSURE'S LINGUISTIC THEORY?

In Saussure's theory, meaning in language arises from differences between signs rather than from any intrinsic value. Words gain meaning through their contrast with other words within the language system.

## THE IMPACT OF SAUSSURE'S COURSE ON LINGUISTIC THEORY

The importance of the Course in General Linguistics extends far beyond its immediate academic context, influencing a broad spectrum of disciplines including anthropology, literary theory, and philosophy. Saussure's framework laid the foundations for structuralism, which dominated mid-20th-century thought and paved the way for post-structuralism and semiotics.

- 2. **ABSTRACT SYSTEMS:** INTRODUCING LANGUE AS AN ABSTRACT, COLLECTIVE SYSTEM AS OPPOSED TO INDIVIDUAL SPEECH ACTS (PAROLE).
- 3. **SEMIOTICS:** Proposing the Linguistic sign as a two-part entity (signifier and signified), which was a foundational concept for modern semiotics.

THIS CONTRAST NOT ONLY EXPANDED THE SCOPE OF LINGUISTIC INQUIRY BUT ALSO ENCOURAGED INTERDISCIPLINARY APPROACHES, POSITIONING LANGUAGE AS A CULTURAL AND COGNITIVE PHENOMENON RATHER THAN A MERE TOOL FOR COMMUNICATION.

### RELEVANCE OF THE COURSE IN MODERN LINGUISTICS EDUCATION

FURTHERMORE, THE COURSE'S INFLUENCE EXTENDS INTO APPLIED LINGUISTICS, WHERE UNDERSTANDING THE ARBITRARY NATURE OF LINGUISTIC SIGNS AIDS IN LANGUAGE TEACHING, TRANSLATION, AND ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE APPLICATIONS. BY FRAMING LANGUAGE AS A SYSTEM OF DIFFERENCES, EDUCATORS AND RESEARCHERS CAN BETTER APPRECIATE THE NUANCES OF MEANING-MAKING AND COMMUNICATION PROCESSES.

These disputes and many others can now be resolved on basis of the work now published. This reveals new depth and subtetly in Saussure's thoughts on the nature and complex workings of language, particularly his famous binary oppositions between form and meaning, the sign and what is signified, and language (langue) and its performance (parole).
