John Kyler would remain a prisoner for 15 months. While Brown was aware of her father's heroic survival, accounts of the ordeal were not easily spoken of by her father. "It never felt comfortable to ask about that time in his life that he had put behind him," Brown says. "I believe that men like my father - men who had witnessed so many life changing events - felt both lucky and guilty to survive when many of their comrades did not. I remember months before his death I told him he should write a book, and I would be his secretary and help him record his memories. He responded, 'What's there to write about?', and that was it." Brown's father would pass away suddenly soon thereafter.
